- Cultural learning through Ngutana-Lui programs & Elder visits.
- Community connection with Come & Yarn morning tea & NAIDOC Week events for families.
- Physical Acknowledgment of Country & physical displays of respect throughout the College with Deadly Crew & Elder consultation.
- Access to QATSIF and Pathways support/opportunities.
- Dedicated Student Leadership positions First Nations Student Ambassadors.
